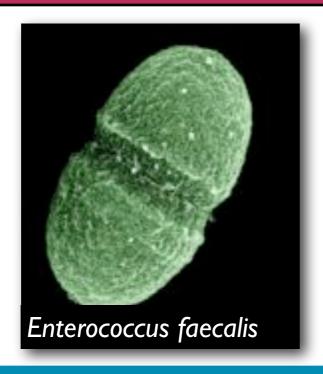

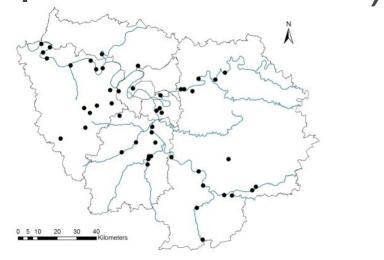

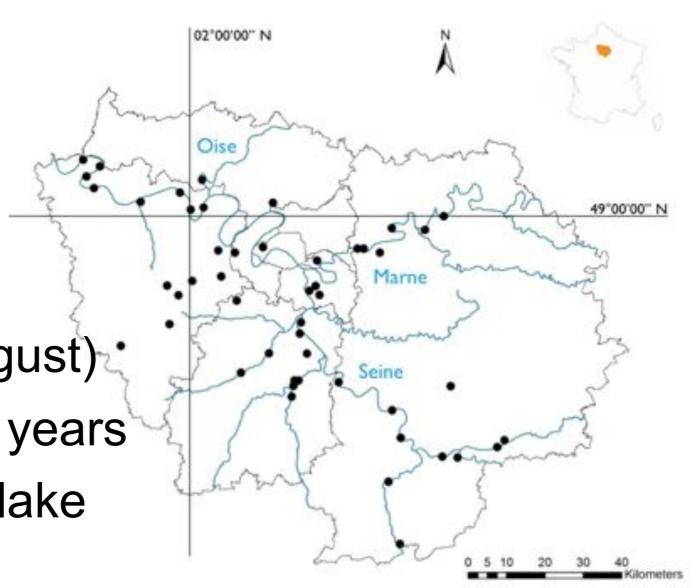
* Larger scale: impact of land use

- 48 lakes monitored

lle-de-France region

contrasted watersheds: size, land use, water management, etc.

- once a year (July-August)
- for three consecutive years
- 1 pooled sample per lake



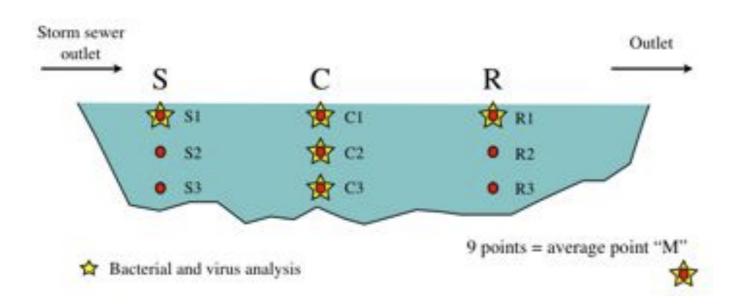

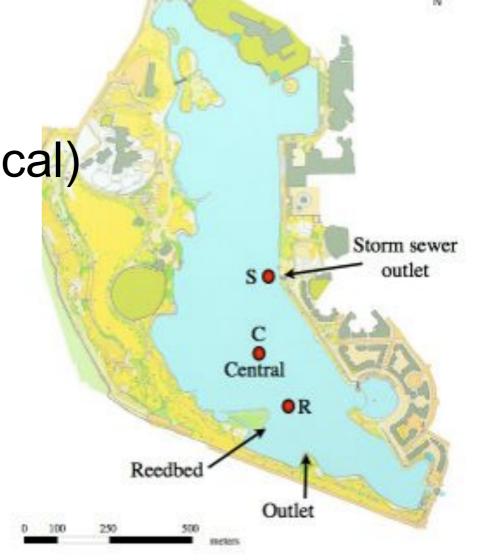
- * Larger scale: impact of land use
- * Finner scale: impact of temporal and spatial variability

Créteil Lake

monthly monitoring

- 2 transects (horizontal/vertical)

Bacterial communities

diversity: characterization of microbial communities
 dHPLC (Denaturing High-Performance Liquid Chromatography)
 sequencing (one the three 48 lakes campaigns - Créteil Lake)

- density: cytometry (other laboratory, ESE, Orsay France)

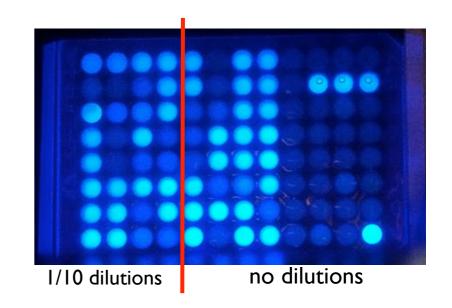

- * Indicators of faecal pollution:
 - density: Most Probable Number

E. coli (NF EN ISO 9308-3) intestinal enterococci (NF EN ISO 7899-1)



- * Environmental pathogens: NonTuberculous Mycobacteria (NTM)
 - density : quantitative PCR hightly specific
 - structure : dHPLC

Achieved

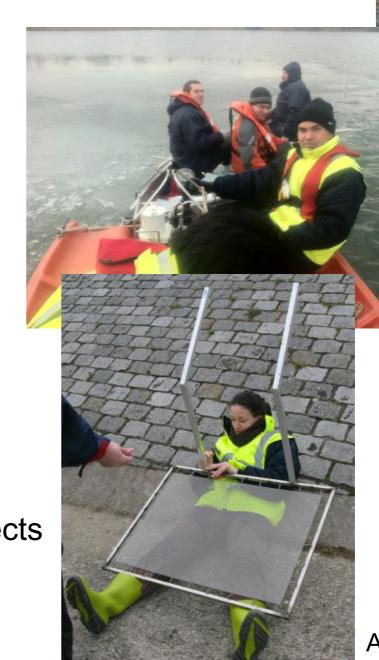
- First 48 lakes campagn achieved (preparation of the next one)
